

HogWatch Scotland – Mammal Footprint Tunnel

A Mammal Footprint Tunnel can provide a non-invasive and effective presence/absence survey method for small mammals, particularly hedgehogs. The animal walks over ink pads to reach bait left inside the tunnel, leaving footprints on the tracking paper, which can then be identified.

Equipment:

- Corregated plastic or thick cardboard for tunnel & tracking plate (standard size 1230 x 1000mm -48 x 39 inch)
- A4 paper
- Paper clips
- Masking tape
- Scissors
- Bait (cat/dog food, hedgehog food, chopped unsalted peanuts)
- Shallow bait dish (optional)
- Charcoal power
- Vegetable ink
- Mixing pot
- Paintbrush
- Tent pegs

How to Take Part

Hedgehogs can be surveyed for at any time during their active period, between April and October in the UK. Studies have shown that hedgehogs use linear features to navigate, so it's important that you position the tunnels along something like a fence, wall or hedge line. Tunnels should be flush with the ground and open at both ends.

Step 1: Remove your tracking plate and paper clip in place two sheets of A4 paper at either end.

Step 2: Mix up the ink solution in a mixing dish. One tsp charcoal power to 3 tsp vegetable oil and stir well.

Step 3: Cut four strips of standard masking tape and create ink pads (2 strips per ink pad – around 80mm total width) which are equidistant from the centre of the tunnel (leaving a gap of around 60mm in the centre)

Step 4: Paint on the charcoal ink power with a paintbrush covering the ink strips completely, place a handful of bait in the centre of the tracking place (or inside the bait dish)

Step 5: Move the tunnel into place and slide in the tracking plate with paper, ink strips and bait in place. Peg down each end of the tunnel to secure.

Footprints

Hedgehog footprints look like small human handprints, showing a visible 'thumb'. The front foot is much broader than the hind foot.
