

Session Outline: Stone Age Survival Year 3-4

National curriculum: This day supports the history curriculum 'changes in Britain from the Stone age to the Iron age' by providing an experience of using stone age skills in a natural setting. The children should come prepared to get muddy and try out some new experiences.
